Purpose of the event

This event focused on understanding issues and influence of heritage (tangible/intangible, cultural/natural/mixed and movable/immovable) on sustainable development of communities in Africa and Arab States Regions. As a matter of fact, heritage is experienced both at personal and collective scales. In essence, individuals and communities in Africa and Arab States regions are connected to heritage, while also many of these heritage are shared across persons, groups and communities. Beyond the existence value of heritage, heritage can also be leveraged as soft power within the community to bring about social inclusion, development and communal understanding and dialogue. In view of this, the advantage of understanding the heritage of different communities in these regions is not only limited to having knowledge about the heritage but also to appreciate the peculiarities such as culture and art of our communities and across generations to bring about intercommunal and intergenerational dialogue.

The event will run for 2 hours with each participant presenting on any heritage within Africa and Arab States regions. Participants will also proffer responses to the following questions:

- i. What would you define as your heritage?
- ii. What are the values and significance of the heritage?
- iii. Why do you think this is heritage?
- iv. What does it (response to Q1) means to you?
- v. What is the current state of the heritage? How is the heritage used/practiced and managed?
- vi. What are the threats and risks facing the heritage?
- vii. How can the heritage be leveraged for sustainable development within the community?

Participation

The event had a total of 15 presentations (see Figure 1) from ICOMOS Emerging Professionals, talking about heritage in the region, cultural, tangible, intangible, and natural heritage, from Nigeria, Algeria, Syria, Côte d'Ivoire, Egypt, Tunisia, Cameroon, Niger, etc. The event has been running in two languages, English and French, to allow larger participation.

Total of participation in the webinar ranges around 70 persons from various countries across Africa, Asia, Europe, Australia, South America and North America. The webinar ended with more that 30 minutes of Questions and Answers to allow for fruitful conversation where participants asked their questions in English and French. Also, a short survey was circulated among the participants for feedback purposes.

Feedbacks

Most of the feedbacks collected focused on having subtitles in languages other than the language of presentation and technical difficulties. One of the participants from stated that *the only problem for me is half of the presentations are in French and I don't know French, so I could only see the photos. Maybe, in the future, some other solutions could be found like subtitles.*

Lessons Learnt

- i. Future webinars will be conducted using Zoom Webinar platform as alternative to Zoom meeting platform.
- ii. Translated version (English and French) of the presentation will be presented as overlay during presentation.
